# Background of SOR



#### **National State Opioid Response (SOR) Initiative:**

- **Purpose:** To address the overdose crisis, primarily driven by illicit fentanyl, in part by:
  - Increasing access to medications for OUD treatment and support prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services.
  - Providing resources to states and territories for evidence-based treatments, practices, and interventions for OUD and STUD.

#### **DSAMH's SOR Initiative**

- Statewide Focus: Implement multifaceted efforts to enhance Delaware's system of care for OUD/STUD.
- Key Populations:
  - · Pregnant and parenting individuals
  - · Racial and ethnic minorities
  - · Justice-involved individuals
  - LGBTQ+ individuals
  - Young people (school-aged and transition-aged)

## SOR 4.0 VISION & PRIORITIES



#### Vision

• Delawareans have positive treatment outcomes and long-term recovery from OUD and STUD.

#### **Priorities**

- Delawareans have rapid access to low-barrier medications for OUD
- Delawareans have access to services that address stimulant use
- Special health needs populations have ready access to services
- Social determinants of health are addressed concurrently to treatment
- Delawareans have support navigating care transitions and do not fall through the cracks
- Delawareans are reached, who would not otherwise be, through screening, assertive outreach, and engagement
- Partnerships and new care pathways are created with entities that have high touch engagement with people who have OUD/STUD, and that facilitate pathways to long-term recovery

## TAP Overview



#### What is TAP?

 A DSAMH initiative to award SOR funding to expand the State's capacity to engage and serve populations with OUD/STUD. TAP began in 2021 under Delaware's SOR 2 grant and is entering its third iteration under the SOR 4 grant.

#### How is TAP funded?

- DSAMH's SOR 4 grant is funded by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).
- This solicitation is for new funding opportunities under SOR 4 Year 1 TAP Tier 4.B and 4.C, available to eligible organizations for the period of January 2025 through September 29, 2025.
- Additional awards may be funded by the SOR 3.0 No-Cost Extension (NCE).

Note: This cohort of applications is contingent upon pending federal approval of funding. Projects are selected and awarded by DSAMH as federal funding availability allows.

# TAP Tiers At A Glance



TAP Tier	Purpose	Maximum Awards
Tier 4.A	To fund projects to implement OUD/STUD screening, brief intervention, referral to treatment, (SBIRT) and follow-up.	\$75,000
Tier 4.B	Projects to implement <u>new</u> evidence-based practices, promising practices, and/or innovations for individuals at risk for, or with, OUD and STUD. There are two tracks available under this solicitation: 1) treatment providers; and 2) community-based organizations (CBOs).	\$300,000
Tier 4.C	Projects that implement tailored OUD/STUD programming to improve outcomes for a sub-population of individuals with SUD. <i>Note: recruiting special populations for a standard project/EBP does NOT qualify.</i> Also, two tracks available: 1) treatment providers; and 2) CBOs).	\$300,000

## Tier 4.B: Treatment Provider Track



#### **GOAL**

 Implement <u>new</u>, innovative, evidencebased or promising practices to sustainably improve OUD/STUD treatment outcomes or enhance treatment provider capabilities for measurable improvements in patient care.

#### **ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS**

 DSAMH-licensed SUD treatment providers, recovery support service organizations, as well as other medical or behavioral health practices/programs interested in expanding their current scope of services to include SUD treatment or to enhance existing services or programs addressing OUD/STUD.

## ORGANIZATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- Two years of experience
- Compliance with Licensing, Accreditation, and Certification Requirements
- Completion of GPRA data collection at baseline, follow-up, and discharge (for individuals receiving grant-funded treatment AND/OR recovery support services)

## Tier 4.B: Treatment Provider Track-Funding Parameters



## Award Amount: Up to \$300,000

- The proposed budget must match the level of effort by staff/contractors and the reasonable and appropriate costs associated with the scope of the project.
- ➤ DSAMH reserves the right to make an award at a funding level that is reasonable and appropriate, different than what is requested in the application.
- Applications with excessive funding requests not justified in the budget will be rejected and returned to the applicant for revision, delaying determination for an award.

## Tier 4.B: CBO Track



#### GOAL

- Engage individuals with OUD/STUD or expand the capacity of other CBOs to engage individuals effectively.
- Projects that propose engagement of individuals with OUD/STUD should use engagement best practices, address participants' healthrelated social needs and have a measurable positive impact on treatment outcomes, quality of life and/or other indicators of improved well-being.
- All projects must be able to measurably demonstrate intended improvements.

#### **ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS**

 Non-profit, non-Medicaid billing, community-based social and human service organization (e.g., social services, religious organizations, food banks).

## ORGANIZATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- IRS 501(c)3 exemption verification
- Current Certificate of Liability Insurance Coverage
- Unique Entity Identifier (UEI)
- Delaware eSupplier Number
- Organization and its staff provide active support of individuals who are interested in or are currently taking MOUD as part of their recovery.
- Ability to conduct client outcomes surveys (e.g., MIRC or BARC-10)

## Tier 4.B: CBO Track-Funding Parameters



## Award Amount: *Up to* \$300,000

- The proposed budget must match the level of effort by staff/contractors and the reasonable and appropriate costs associated with the scope of the project.
- ➤ DSAMH reserves the right to make an award at a funding level that is reasonable and appropriate, different than what is requested in the application.
- Applications with excessive funding requests not justified in the budget will be rejected and returned to the applicant for revision, delaying determination for an award.

## Tier 4.C: Treatment Provider Track

### Tier 4.C-Specific Key Criteria:

Applicant must implement a <u>new</u> EBP, promising practice or innovation to tailor their treatment program to improve treatment outcomes for a sub-population of individuals with OUD/STUD. The sub-population may have unique needs (e.g., cultural, situational) that, when addressed, will result in improved outcomes.
 Recruiting special populations into existing programs is <u>not</u> a tailored treatment program because this award is designed to support specialized programming for a special population. DSAMH will not consider outreach/marketing projects as meeting the requirements.

# Tier 4.C: Treatment Provider Track-Project Design Guidance

- Offer a culturally adapted recovery support tool
- Implement Family-based/focused EBP/EBT Implementation

- Provide Culturally Congruent Interventions for African Americans with OUD

# TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (TA)



#### **SOR 4.0 awardees will participate in two kinds of TA:**

#### **Program Integrity Specialists**

- Oversight and progress monitoring, barrier reduction, and support/guidance to help grantees understand and comply with the requirements of DSAMH's SOR 4.0 funding.
- Support focuses on:
  - Financial reporting
  - Performance measurement
  - Compliance with laws and regulations
- Approach: Check-in Calls and Site Visits

#### **Practice Coaching**

- TA aimed at professional development that helps healthcare professionals improve their skills/knowledge in a specific area of practice. Support focuses on:
  - Program implementation
  - Operationalizing evidence-based practices
  - Patient care
  - Teamwork and Communication
  - Fidelity monitoring
- Approach: Learning Network Series

# TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (CONT'D)



# Program Integrity Specialist Check-ins

• Each TAP awardee is required to participate in monthly check-ins to update on progress/barriers and to help grantees understand and comply with the requirements of DSAMH's SOR 4.0 funding.

## **Practice Coaching**

- Key staff must participate in an assigned peer learning cohort series.
- Any projects that focus on Contingency Management implementation require additional upfront education and training completion.

## Required TA

Additional required TA or coaching may be assigned by DSAMH.

Used to evaluate how well the project is performed and if anyone is better off as a result

Includes both standardized and provider specific measures



BASED ON GPRA DATA AS OF 9/30/2022 - 8/31/2024




Current Intake GPRAs towards Goal

# Future DSAMH Funding Opportunities

### Future, specialized, multi-year, TAP opportunity



DSAMH plans to release additional specialized opportunities under TAP by Q2 2025. The Multi-Year Targeted Projects (MYTP) will be specialized opportunities to design and implement specific and complex interventions over a period of 2.5 years, with significant design and technical assistance support from the state. Anticipated funding will support two full years of project implementation after design/approval and are equal in annual value to the TAP 4.B and 4.C tiers.

Applicants for these opportunities must have successfully implemented a HEAP or TAP project with DSAMH previously. DSAMH anticipates awarding between 1-4 awards for a targeted cohort of projects depending upon the quantity and quality of applications. Additional details will be released later this fall.

# Health Equity Advancement Project (HEAP)



DSAMH is continuing the Health Equity Advancement Project (HEAP) initiative for a third year to support organizations to implement approaches to engage racial/ethnic minorities in Delaware who are impacted by OUD/STUD. Two opportunities are available and will be released in October 2024:

#### **Mini-Grants**

Provides direct funding to treatment/recovery organizations and community-based organizations to implement foundational activities that better equip organizations to address the needs of racial/ethnic minorities impacted by OUD/STUD.

- **HEAP TX**: Up to \$75,000 per treatment/recovery organization to conduct equity-focused data analyses to inform program design that improves outcomes for vulnerable populations.
- HEAP CBO: Up to \$50,000 per CBO to build internal capacity to address OUD/STUD, develop and enhance referral pathways, and engage and convene community stakeholders.

### **Community Awareness Partnerships**

Provides in-kind support and resources to community-based organizations and community leaders to develop and implement community education/awareness campaign strategies addressing OUD/STUD, with a focus on reaching racial/ethnic minorities.

Community partners will have access to a Campaign Planner to assist in the design of a customized campaign, including but not limited to speaker's bureau, listening sessions, and social media campaigns. No direct funding will be provided, but DSAMH will purchase & provide in-kind materials and provide technical assistance to support implementation of the campaign.

### Grassroots Messaging and Awareness Program



### Stay Tuned!

• DSAMH's Grassroots Messaging & Awareness Program solicitation will be released later this fall.

### Goal:

• To support anti-stigma and prevention education/awareness efforts conducted to engage with hard-to-reach populations where local/grassroots messaging will have a stronger impact than state-level efforts.

### **Intended Applicants:**

- Non-profit community-based and/or advocacy organizations that can reach at least one of the six target populations of Delawareans (noted above) with anti-stigma and OUD/STUD prevention messaging
- Health and human services providers that serve individuals with OUD/STUD.
- Note: Applicants must have the capacity to contract with DSAMH.
